



National First-Generation College Celebration was held on November 8th from 12-2. TRIO, in partnership with Act 101, Student Success, and DEI, welcomed back five LHU alum who were first-generation college students: Dr. Timothy Bowers, Judge William Amesbury, Bailey Yearick, Madison Leister, and Patricia Haas Ulmer.

After opening remarks by TRIO Director Natalie Serafini discussing the background of our panelist, she then turned the floor over to them, allowing them time to answer questions and give advice to the attendees. Towards the end of the event, attendees were given a free lunch and an opportunity to speak one-onone with the panelists.

Madison Leister was a TRIO peer mentor during her time here at LHU. She wants to go to graduate school to become a child life specialist. Page 7

Judge William Amesbury has worked in Drug Court treatment and Juvenile Court. He went to graduate school for social work. Patricia Haas Ulmer works at the Geisinger Library Services where she is the director. She helps educate health care professionals.

Bailey Yearick works in the healthcare field where she trains nurses and works one-on-one with children.

Dr. Timothy Bowers is the superintendent of Williamsport Area School District. He graduated from LHU with a health and physical education degree. He is on the board for NCERT (National Center for Education, Research, and Technology) and National Superintendents Roundtable.

The panelist shared their struggles and surprises they had as first-generation college students. Dr. Bowers shared that he initially had many misconceptions about college only being for wealthy people and had to overcome those stereotypes. Judge Amesbury said that motivation and food insecurity were his biggest challenges. He gave students in attendance advice to challenge themselves and keep persevering. Bailey talked about her experiences with anxiety and said that failing one class does not mean that you won't succeed at all in your college education.

Natalie asked the panelist about skills that students should be working to obtain in their

undergraduate years. Bailey's advice was to get volunteer experience and people skills (which can be obtained through our Community Service Office and Christine Wise). Ask for more things to do to get those experiences and skills. Maddy's advice was to be kind and connect to people. Many people she works with come to her needing help, so she needs to be able to understand them. Dr. Bowers advised us to build relationships and have meaningful conversations. Patricia's advice was to build relationships, have effective communication, and be good leaders.

Finally, Natalie allowed the opportunity for the panelist to give advice for all firstgeneration students. Judge Amesbury told us to enjoy our undergraduate experience, ask questions, and learn from our mistakes. Much like the saying "Fall down 7 times, get up 8."

Patricia's advice was to keep going and when you are struggling find someone to help you. Dr. Bowers' advice was to not wish our life away since this is one of the best times of our lives. Bailey advised us that, "It can be hard to get back on track, but you can do it. Believe in yourself." Maddy advised us to ask for help from everyone and take their opinions into consideration.
